Having a wireless small bowel capsule endoscopy

Your doctor has advised that you should have a procedure called a wireless small bowel capsule endoscopy.

What is a wireless small bowel capsule endoscopy?

A wireless small bowel capsule endoscopy allows the Doctor or Nurse to look into your gullet, stomach and predominantly the small bowel. It is used to assist in diagnosing gastrointestinal conditions such as inflammatory bowel disease, small bowel bleeding, malabsorption, chronic abdominal pain and chronic diarrhoea.

It involves swallowing a small capsule (about the size of a large vitamin pill), which contains a colour camera, battery, light source and transmitter. Once swallowed the camera moves naturally through the digestive system taking two pictures every second for approximately 10 to 12 hours. These images are transmitted and stored on to a data recorder about the size of a portable CD player worn on a belt around the waist.

What is the benefit of having a wireless small bowel capsule endoscopy?

The main benefit of the procedure is to obtain images to diagnose potential problems of the small bowel.

How do I prepare for a wireless small bowel capsule endoscopy?

If you are taking Iron tablets please stop them one week before the procedure. If you have an internal defibrillator or cardiac pacemaker, please let your doctor or nurse know.

Information for women of childbearing age.

If you are pregnant or think that there is a possibility you could be pregnant, please contact the telephone number at the front of this booklet.

We will need to discuss your individual circumstances as it may be necessary to cancel or delay your appointment.

What do I need to do on the day before the procedure?

You will need to start your bowel preparation as discussed (Moviprep). This allows the small bowel to be seen more clearly. It is essential that you continue to drink clear fluids such as water, black tea or coffee until bedtime, but do not eat solid food after taking this medicine.

Failure to follow these instructions may result in an incomplete examination.

What will happen on the day of the procedure?

You may take medications for heart conditions, high blood pressure, asthma or steroids with a sip of water. Ideally this should be 2 hours before attending. If you require additional information regarding Diabetes please contact nursing staff on 01922 656217 for further instructions.

It is recommended that you attend wearing comfortable clothing, such as jogging bottoms and a t-shirt. Something that you will feel comfortable wearing all day, as you will not be able to get changed until the evening.

When you arrive at the Endoscopy Unit at Walsall Manor Hospital you will be asked to take a seat in the waiting area.

A nurse practitioner will ask you a few health questions and answer any questions that you may have, before you swallow the capsule.

Are there risks in having a wireless small bowel capsule endoscopy?

The majority of wireless small bowel capsule endoscopy is safe and without problems. However, as with any procedure there is a small chance of a complication. National studies have shown only one significant complication:

Retention: The capsule could get stuck somewhere inside the small bowel. This happens in approximately 1 out of every 250 patients we see. Usually once a patient is commenced on the appropriate medication for their needs, the capsule will pass by on its own. If the capsule does not then pass out there may be a need for an operation to remove it, but this is rarely done.

Missed lesions: Although this test has been recommended as the best test to detect any abnormalities, no test is perfect. There is a small risk that we may miss lesions including polyps and rarely cancers.

Consent

You will be asked to sign a consent form to give permission to have the test done. The consent form should be completed prior to the day of the procedure and after you have spoken with a nurse or doctor. Please read all the information on the consent form.

Please bring the consent form with you to your appointment.

Are there any alternatives to a wireless small bowel capsule endoscopy?

There are other methods to see the small bowel, such as double balloon Enteroscopy. However this procedure is more invasive and is usually done using a general anaesthetic at a different hospital. A wireless small bowel capsule endoscopy is by far the safest alternative at this time.

What if I do not have a wireless small bowel capsule endoscopy?

A wireless small bowel capsule endoscopy has been recommended because you have symptoms, or have had other investigations, which suggest diseases of the gullet, stomach or small bowel. If you do not have the procedure done then the problems you have may go on undiagnosed.

During the wireless small bowel capsule endoscopy

After swallowing the capsule you will be asked to stay in the department for up to one hour and then you will be allowed home wearing the belt and data recorder. The nurse will advise you and give you some written information to take home. You will be required to return the belt and data recorder by 09:00 the following morning. If you are not able to do so, a friend or family member could do this for you.

When will I receive the results?

Once the video footage has been viewed a report is sent directly to your Consultant who will then organise the appropriate follow up tests, letters or appointments.

Training

Walsall Healthcare NHS Trust is a Regional Centre for Endoscopy Training. You may be asked if you would be willing to be examined by a trainee consultant / trainee nurse endoscopist. All trainees are under the direct supervision of an expert consultant trainer until they are fully competent; the consultant is there to ensure your safety and comfort. With your help it will be possible to train the specialists of the future.

Clinical Photography

Clinical Photography is the visual recording of clinical conditions for use in your patient record. They are used by Health Care Professionals to help monitor your clinical condition and are often used in the treatment planning process along with other tests such as X-rays, scans and blood tests, etc.

With your permission, clinical photographs can also be used for teaching doctors, nurses and other medical professionals, as well as research, audit and quality assurance purposes.
